COURT PROCEEDINGS.—SUNBURY, Jan. 8.—The Court of Quarter Sessions of Northumberland county, convened at 10 o'clock, A. M. His Honor Judge Jordan and his Associates, Shipman and Nicely, present. The Constables, as usual, swore to their several returns from the different boroughs and townships of the county. The Constables do not very often worry themselves much in hunting up tipping houses, bawdy houses, &c. It is an unpleasant, although a sworn duty. Hence they usually return that they know of no such resorts, while we see on Sunday, very often, men staggering around drunk, and even boys in a drunken condition.

The Court ordered early in the day that a fine of \$25 be imposed upon each and every absent juror, and directed the Clerk to place the fine in the hands of the Sheriff for collection.

The commission of Joseph Nicely as Associate Judge, for five years, was read in open Court. The commission of Jacob Leisering as Register & Recorder, for three years, was also read. It may be a matter of information to some to state that Associate Judges serve for five years, and receive the sum of \$500 per day for each day's service in Court.
