After all the objections urged against the production of this grain; of the immense amount of labor requisite in its cultivation; of the impoverishment of the soil, and the unpromising and uncertain appearance of the growing plants if the spring should be cold and backward, yet it must be acknowledged that, next to grass, it is the greatest crop of the farmer, and far more certain in all season than wheat. The great product per acre of this crop, both in grain and in substantial provender for cattle, must always, it seems to me, make it the farmer's fitvorite grain upon which he must mostly rely. Hence, the methods of its cultivate must always be sought for by the enterprising farmer. That it requires a deep, rich soil, no one will deny, and oneupon which lime has lately been applied is generally found to produce a

better crop in consequence.

In this country the frequent practice is to haul out manure in the winter or spring and plow it under; in the autumn the corn is cut, and shocked in thick rows, separated by wide middles; these middles or intervening space between rows shocks, are harrowed down so as to allow the stalks to be turned under by plow. This is thoroughy pulverized by the harrow and drilled in with wheat: and the yield of wheat on our warm limestone soils is frequently as good as that obtained the next season after the stalk-ground had been put in with oats, and the manure applied previous to sowing with wheat.

Where land is too rich for the profitable production of oats, the above plan has very much to recommend it, any in time must become the 'true and common rotation of corn and wheat. As for eats itself, as our lands become more improved and richer, its culture will have to be abandoned to poor farmers and more sterile lands. There are extensive tracts of naturally poor and mountainous land in the country, fitted for the production of oats or buck-wheat, and upon such lands they should be grown, as they are grains hardly suited to rotate in soils rich enough for corn and wheat.

As regards the depth to plow for corn, there is no question I persume so much disputed among farmers, but in my opinion it altogether depends upon the depth of the soil. If that be foure inches deep you

SPROUTING SWEET POTATOES .- A New Jersy farmer gives the following directions for spouting sweet potatoes :




