my farm.

I do not think fall plowing the best as a general thing. I usually have a large pile of stable manure, which gets in the way by the middle of winter and I manage to have enough plowed in the fall to use up what manure we draw in winter; the rest remains until the frost is out in spring; then plow and spread over the rest of the field, and harrow all together. One year ago we plowed our whole field—manured half of it in winter and the rest in May. After the drought had set in it was so dry that the manure drew up in front of the harrow so much that I had to stop the horses once in ten rols to unload. I concluded then that I should have one failure with manure on the top, unless it rained soon, but no rain come, and when we hoed the first time the manure drew up in front of the cultivator; second and third time, we used a plow; the last hoeing very little manure to be seen; but such a crop of corn and pumpkins has not been raised in my neighbor-hood for years. One corner of the lot, a three-cornered piece, was sowed with com-mon Yankee corn for the cows, it grew so thick and stout that a man could hardly get through it; a good part of it measured over ten feet high. In manuring on the top in such a dry season as the past will not fail, when will it?

And let me say here; First my land is good corn land. Second I manure about forty cords to the acre, with clear manure -the horse manure put in the bottom of the drop-back of the cows daily, which absorbs the liquid, and the whole is thrown out under the barn. No straw is used here for litter, only in the yard; remains until after haying, and is put on the meadows. Third, when the corn ground is thus fitted, I take the plaster sower and go over the pleec, sowing enough to make the manure or soil white, three or four bushels to the nere; this holds the manure. I then make out three or four inches both ways, and put for corns in a bill. When this is all done early success is certain .- Cor. Coun try Gentleman.

TREATMENT OF SPRAINS .- Sprains are usually very painful, and are accompanied with a high degree of inflammation and soreness. The indications are to secure perfect rest of the injured part, and to reduce the inflammation. The inflamma-tion may be reduced by cold wet compresses, renewed as often as they become warm. When the patient has a great deal of vita-lity and there is a high degree of inflammation, the injured part may be immersed in cold water, or a stream of cold water may be poured over it until the pain and soreness has been partially removed, when the cold compresses should be applied. When there is much pain and tenderness and but little heat, hot fomentations, followed by cold compresses, are preferable. When the inflammation and soreness have subsided, friction is useful to promote absorption and strengthen the part. Great care should be exercised about using the injured part until the strength is restored, as it then requires but every little to sprain it again. A second sprain is more difficult to cure then the first .- Herald of Health,

MANURING CORN,-J. F. Larence, in The Vermont Farmer, says:- "In raising Wash. corn, I always break up my land late in the fall, and spread upon it the composted man-ure, made by drawing muck into my yards the fall previous, covering it slightly with rotted fourt, upon which my cattle are kept during pleasant weather in winter, and nights during the next summer. This system is mush cheaper and better for the laud than manuring in the hill, and the freezing and thawing of winter and spring claus and midwives for enfabled and delicate carry the strength of the manure into the constitutions, of both sexes and all ages (attented with any of the above discases or symptoms.) next summer. In spring time, I put a large spoonful of super-phosphate into the hill, and I never have failed to raise good corn. winds of June and July.
