Arrived at the gate of the convent, we were obliged to force our way through a crowd of angry people who demanded an instant permission to enter, and who were as persistently swept back by a group of National Guards—we, however, being admitted inside the door under cover of the official pass and signatures. In the courtvard, under the shade of some fine trees, a

few guards were PLAYING BOWLS IN THE JESUITS' ALLEY, and making up to one of them whose cap displayed tokens of authority, we mentioned our business, and begred permission to see what was to be seen.
