nant spirit —a heart regardless of social duty, and deliberately bent on mischief. Any formed de-sign of doing mischief, may be called mather. Express malice is, when one person kills another with a sedate, deliberate mind and formed de-sign, or does any other act of a serious nature. with the same sedate and deliberate mind, and

a murder in the first degree. The intention to kill may be formed for a length of time before the commission of the act, or it may exist but a short time. If there is suffelent time for the passions to cool, if they have been excited—time to deliberate and consider, and the intent is to take life, it is murder in the first degree. The law assigns no limits in which cooling time may be said to take place. Every case must depend on its own circumstances.
