THERE was an immense meeting of the tax-payers of New York city, at Cooper Institute, on the 11th inst., to consider the recent grave charges of corruption and peculation made against the city officials. Ex-Mayor William F. Havemeyer presided and among the prominent men on the plat-form were Henry Clewes, ex-Sheriff O Brien Peter Cooper, Marshall O. Roberts, Moses Taylor, and John Jacob Astor. A series of twelve resolutions were adopted, which declare the city and county debt more than doubled within the last two and a half years, being new \$113,000,000, or over \$63,-000,000 more than when Mayor Hall was first inaugurated. It is also believed that many millions mere will be paid out on floating and contingent claims unless the present officials are removed, or their proceedingly arrested. The fourth resolution directed implicates William M. Tweed, Richard B. Connolly, and A. Oakley Hall, as the parties who should be arryed at the bar of public opinion for these offences. Specches were made by ex-Mayor Have-meyer, Judge Emott, Oswald O. Ottendor-fer, Hon. R. R. Roosevolt, ex-Governor olomon, and Hon. Edwards Pierrepont. The meeting was composed of members of all political parties, and the speeches were both from Republicans and Democrats.

Concerning this meeting, the New York Tribune of Tuesday says: "No incident in the political bistory of New York for many years has given us so much hope for the future of the metropolis as the meeting last night at Cooper Institute. Deep as the indignation of the people has been over the recent disclosures of fraud, carnest as close observers have seen the popular purpose to be to put an end to this wholesale swindling at once and forever, few were prepared for such an imposing demonstration as this, which assured us that at heart the rank and file of the Democracy as well as of the Republican party are friends of honest government and the

bitter enemies of every species of fraud. *

It revives our confidence in the American system of Republican government to see that when an emergency is fairly presented the people can thus cast behind them selfish considerations and unite in working for the public good, good work has begun Let as go on in the enrnest, practical and unpartisan grit with which it opened last night, and the infamy of the Tammany Ring will soon be a thing of the past."


