How to Plant. F. Whiting, an experienced fruit grower, at Jeffersonville, Montgomery county, contributes an excellent article on tree planting in the Norristown Herald, from which

> SUGAR BEETS FOR HOGS .- When cows are fulling off somewhat in their culk at this season, and before corn is quite ready to pull, I have always found my hogs go a ittle behind hand, or at least stop thriving and growing, barely holding their own. To avoid buying feed for this emergency, I commence throwing in to them sugar beets, which have a surprising effect. They really fatten on them, and require but little corn to finish them off. With 25 hogs, I think I save at least 50 bushels of corn by seeding the beets, and have them ready for an earlier market when the sausage men come around. I have raised sugar beets for many years, finding them invaluable for cows all through our long winter—but drop this note to the "Practical Parmer," especially with reference to their value as fixed for hogs.—J.
