AN ORDINANCE, Regulating the Markets in the Borough of Sunbury.

SECTION 1 Be it ordained by the Enrgesses and Town Council of the Borough of Sunbury, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same; That from and after the passage of this ordnance there shall be held two (2) markets in each week during the year, to wit; On Weilnesday and Saturday. The market hours shall be between the hours of four and nine a. m., during the months of May June, July August and September, and between the hours of five and ten a. m., during the remainder of the year. And each and every person who shall buy or sell anything in the market, aforesaid, shall pay a fine of one (\$1) dollar for each and every offence, and the costs. Provided however, that occupants of shops or store houses or stands on side walks within the Borough may sell at all hours during secular days, except on market days they shall not sell before regular market hours.

market days they shall not sell defore regular market hours.

SECTION 2. No person or persons, shall be permitted to peddle or vend on the streets of this Borough, any eggs, meat, butter, poultry fruit or vegetables, from wagons carts or other conveyances, on any day of the week except on regular lar market days, and on such days only after the hours fixed above for closing the said markets, un-der a penalty of five dollars for each and every

offence.
SECTION 3. That market street, from Second to Fifth street, he designated as the market place, extending along the line of the curb from Second street along the south side of Market to Fifth street, thence along the north side of Market street to second street, he designated as the only limits within which market wagons be allowed to stand within the Borough on said market days. The cierk of the market shall set off stations to those designate to genus the same regularly, and those desiring to occupy the same regularly, and shall have general supervision over the market place, so as not to allow any laterforence with

the stations selected.

SECTION 4. That no one shall be allowed to occupy any station selected on field market days unless by permit from the regular occupant or the clerk of the unright, and pay person or per-sons violations this section shall be fined one dollar for each and every offence.

Section 6. That no person shall, during market hours, buy or cause to be bought, any articles of provisions, fruit, or other commodity whatever for the purpose of retailing or resciling

whatever for the purpose of retailing or reselling the same.

Section 7. That if any person or persons shall sell or bring to market for sale, any bread, butter, lard, fruit or other provisions, in imaps, loaves, tubs vessels or parcels, as or for a greater weight or measure than the true weight or measure thereof, or shall supply any device for imposition or fraud in the sale of any provisions, the sale articles so offeretfor sale, shall be forfeited to the use of the Borough.

SECTION S. That all beef, perk, mutton, lamb yeal, and all kinds of poultry and fish, and all other articles of food whatever, that shall be brought to the market or publicity exposed to sale in the Borough, and shall be found discussed, tainted, or in any manner rendered unwhole-some or unfit for use, and all year which when killed

tainted, or in any manner rendered unwholesome or unit for use, and all year which when killed shal not have been of the age of four (4) weeks, be forfeited, and the person or persons exposing the same for sale shall moreover, in connection thereof, forfeit and pay a the of five dollars for the use of the Borough.

SECTION 9. That for any and every infraction or violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, (not otherwise provided for,) the offender or offenders shall be fined in any sum not less than three, nor more than ten dollars, at the descretion of the Burgess, of any Justice of the Peace of the said Borough, before whom the offenders may be prosecuted to conviction. All fines imposed by this ordinance shall be recovered as herein provided for, and shall be paid into the
