MEDICINE FOR POULTRY .-- In ordinary cases it will not pay to give medicine to sick fowls. In the first place but little is known of the disease of poultry, and again there is an equal dearth of knowledge respecting remedies. Besides, the value of an average fowl is so inconsiderable that treatment will not pay unless very simple and very successful. The best course re-specting poultry allment is prevention. Try to secure such vigorous breeding stock and such complete sanitary conditions for all the birds at all ages, that illness will be rare. Then the strength of constitution will be such that any ordinary disease can be resisted without the aid of medicine, if good nursing is given. What we mean by nursing is this : Place sick fowls in a dry, sunny place out of the wind and safe from disturbance. Then give them food easy of digestion, such as much, potatoes and meat, every article cooked, and warm milk for drink. If, after all, they can't make out to live, say to yourself, by way of congratulation, "there are so many birds, not dis-case proof, that have been weeded out of my stock, at any rate,"

How MUCH LAND IS NECESSARY TO KEEP & COW .- Wm. Johnson, Allentown Pa., wishes to keep a cow on half an acre of ground ; can he do it ?-Yes, if the ground is sufficiently rich and properly managed. Half the ground should be in clover, which will be ready to cat in June and will last three months; one fourth should be put in corn for fodder, in drills two feet apart, planted quite thickly in the row (twelve grains to the foot), and well hoed and weeded ; this may be used occasionly to help out the clover, if necessary. The remainder of the ground should be put in turnips, or sugar beets, or partly both, and may yield two hundred bushels, which, with the stalks left over, will feed the cow through the winter and until the clover is ready again .- Remedy, the tops of the beets and turnips will last quite a time, if used economically. Keep them in a cellar in a heap, well pressed down and covered with bourds.


KEEPING CAULIFLOWERS .- The cauliflowers is an annual plant, while the cab-bage is blennial, and the former is therefore much more difficult to keep, and with the utmost care cannot be kept as well as the cabbage. It is also only half hardy, much less hardy than the cabbage. While the heads are but slightly affected by frost, they are injured or destroyed if exposed to a very low temperature. A common practice is to take them up in November with as much earth as possible about their roots, and after gathering the leaves carefully over the heads, reset them in earth in a light, dry cellar, or in any other light, dry location, secure from freezing.  $\Lambda$  cold frame, if at hand, might be advantageously employed for the purpose.
