County Superintendents.

Friend Wilcox: As you and many of your readers are well aware of the fact, that the time is rapidly approaching for the election, by the School Directors of the county, of a Superintendent of the county schools, for a three year term, and for the last month I have been anxiously watching the various papers published in the county, expecting to find the friends of education taking an active part in the canvass that is now being made by the aspirants after the position. But as none have appeared to advocate the claims of either candidate, I will, if you will, kindly give space in your returns, to have a plain talk with the School Directors who are by law entitled to participate in the election. Do not neglect your duties on this point, for the good of the county, by all means, let your political relations and sympathies remain dormant, consider well the qualifications of each candidate, and next that upon your actions hang the welfare of the free schools for the next three years.

To the readers of your paper who are not connected with the free schools, but who are interested in the welfare of the county, I would say that there are three candidates, Mr. Saul Shipman the present incumbent, Prof. John, of the Milton High School, and J. J. Reimann, of the Milton High School.

OF Mr. Shipman's success as a Superintendent, all connected with the free schools of the county are well aware, notwithstanding that he has had many failures at county Institutes, has estranged some teachers, yet his re-election would give general satisfaction.

Prof. John is the best fitted for the position of all the candidates. A graduate of Lafayette College, for a long time a teacher in one of the State Normal schools, and having been for some time connected with the Methodist Episcopal Church as a Minister of the Gospel, his experience in teaching, and with the duties of a public life, connected with his logic and readiness in explanation, are all in favor of his election. He is one to be chosen, before all others, for this responsible position.

As for J. J. Reimann, I will say in behalf of the Teachers of the county, that they do not want the schools of the county degenerated by giving them into the hands of a candidate for nearly every office within the gift of the people, and will stoop to the superintendency of the pedagogues and children of the county, when the people do not require such a service in dealing out Justice from the bench.

Hope that this will call forth the opinions of other Teachers and friends of education, better calculated to discuss the question than your correspondent. I remain, yours, &c., "EDUCATOR."
