THE Town Council at their last meeting, decided on improving the public square in Market street by enclosing it with an iron ralling and laying out walks, &c. The square will extend from Second to Third street, with a street on each side. Workmen commenced on Monday morning last in filling up the low places, and before many weeks we may expect to see this laudable enterprise completed. This will be one of the best improvements yet made by our borough fathers, and we hope they will continue in the progress of improving the streets and alleys To do this it will require money, but we do not believe any citizen will object to paying a tax when improvements are made which will enhance the value of property generally, and give the town a better appearance than it ever had before.

IMPROVEMENTS .- Messrs. Isnac May & Co., the lessees of Burnside colliery, are engaged at present in making some extensive improvements at their colliery. On Monday last they commenced sinking a slope on the second lift of one side, which they expect to have completed in three months. They think that by sinking about 75 yards they will strike the basin. When this is reached a large area of the finest Burnside coal will be open to them, which will increase the capacity of their colliery to 10,000 tons per mouth.

They have also commenced driving the big tunnel, known as the "Bittenbender tunnel," the contract of which has been allotted to N. Deitman. They propose driving this work until they cut the No. 10 veln and the twin velns, which they expect to cut on driving about 150 yards. This work is to be completed by February, 1873. What is remarkable about this work and worthy of special notice is that while all these improvements are being made the regular shipments of the colliery (6000 tons per month) are steadlly session given on the first day of April.
