

The Legislatures of Illinois and Ohio have passed resolutions of censure on the Members of Congress from those States, respectively, who voted for the extra Congressional pay.

Dr. Wm. M. Rutherford, the oldest physician in Harrisburg, and a gentleman of high standing in his profession, died on Thursday morning, week aged 68 years.

The wife of Hon. J. Lawrence Getz died in Reading, on Sunday.

SCHUYLER COLFAX arrived at South Bend, Ind., on Saturday. He proceeded in a carriage to the Court House, followed by an escort consisting of carriages and wagons as far as the eye could reach. After an address of welcome by Mayor Miller, Mr. Colfax made a lengthy speech in answer to the charges against him in connection with the Credit Mobilier business. At the conclusion of his speech Col. Humphreys presented him with a letter having 1500 signatures attached, expressing the signers' confidence in the ex-Vice-President. A resolution to the same effect was also unanimously adopted by those present.

The President defers indefinitely his trip South, but intimates that at some future time he will make the round among several prominent southern cities. While he is undoubtedly compelled, by the pressure of public business, to defer this visit, it is very desirable that it should be made at the earliest opportunity. It would give him a clear insight into the condition of the South, and bring about an era of good feeling in every way desirable.

Oakes Ames' neighbors give him a public dinner on his return home. They seem to admire his sharp Yankee tricks. The Representatives, in nearly all cases, are no worse than the people whom they represent. Public honesty is not likely to be very bad unless private virtue is at a discount.

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, on Monday, in Philadelphia, affirmed the Constitutionality of the Local Option law in a case brought up from the Twenty-second ward of Philadelphia. We will publish the opinions of the Supreme Judges in our next issue.

Geo. S. Boutwell, Secretary of the Treasury, was elected to the U. S. Senate, by the Massachusetts Legislature, on Wednesday last week. The vote stood: Boutwell, 252; Dawes, 115; Geo. B. Loring, 2; and six others scattering. He took his seat in the Senate on Tuesday last.

Mrs. Catharine Cloak was murdered in her bed, in Philadelphia, on Friday night, by blows from an axe. Her husband, who is a machinist by trade, and a man of intemperate habits, has been arrested for the crime, and the evidence against him leaves scarcely a doubt of his guilt.

HON. GEO. S. BOUTWELL, Secretary of the Treasury, was elected to the United States Senate, by the Legislature of Massachusetts, on Wednesday, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Vice President Wilson.

COL. R. B. BRATH forwarded us a circular embodying the conclusions of a committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, relative to the establishment of industrial schools for the benefit of soldiers' orphans. It will be remembered that Geo. Hartranft advertised to this subject in his annual message. The committee referred to, after giving the subject mature consideration, report against the formation of industrial schools, assigning as reasons that but a few industrial branches, and those of the plainest kind, could be taught, while the children would feel that they were on a par with those of the reform school. What is proposed, is embraced in the following paragraph of the General Order issued: "We propose that this idea be so extended that scholars, who desire it, and are qualified therefor, may be sent to the School of Design for Women, the Agricultural College for Normal Schools, and, further, that the people be induced to learn any of the mechanic or high arts that could not be learned at their homes, or in small villages and interior towns, shall be provided, through the aid of the members of the Grand Army, with places in machine shops or elsewhere, and also with homes where they could be under proper influence, and that the State should make up the deficiency between the amount earned by them and that required for their support during the first year or two. Many girls who now have to struggle along as seamstresses, could earn a livelihood as photographers, and many boys, who are in a natural talent for engineering or machinery, could learn these professions, obtain good salaries and occupy a higher place in the community than under existing circumstances."

Thirty thousand dollars will be asked of the Legislature to carry this plan into effect. It is proposed to place this sum in the hands of Governor Hartranft and Superintendent Wickham. It is a worthy measure and deserves success.

THE POSTAL LAW.

How it Changes Letter Rates—The Free Exchange of Newspapers Abolished.

We are not at all sorry to find, as we have done in inquiring at the Post Office Department, that the proposition to reduce letter postage, together with other changes in postal matter proposed by the House Committee, failed in the Senate. Believing that the change proposed was not called for, and that it would very materially diminish the postal revenue, and that the Department at that time when it is incurring large expenditures, to facilitate the prompt distribution and transmission of mail matter on postal cars, and to improve the service generally, we took occasion to dissent from the recommendations of the committee at the time they were made. Our belief, as then expressed, was, and still is, that in view of the much higher prices paid for mail transportation in this country, the wide diffusion of mail facilities over a territory so much greater than that of England, which has been our model, we have retained the rates of postage to the lowest point attainable, without involving the necessity of large appropriations by Congress. Three cent postage here, considering the service rendered, is quite as cheap as penny postage in England.

It had been the aim and desire of Congress and the Department to bring the letter to a rate of one cent, and it is possible that it will ultimately do if we are not compelled to pay too heavily for railroad service. The postal car system has very largely increased the burdens of the Department, but it has wonderfully facilitated distribution and celerity of transmission, especially at times of great emergency. The clerical force required for this service is large and expensive and constantly increasing as postal cars multiplied. The roads exact increased pay at an alarming rate. At such a time, therefore, we cannot wisely attempt a further reduction of letter postage. Three cents for carrying a letter from Boston to San Francisco, Lower California, or Oregon, is a pretty small figure. Yet, having once established a uniform rate we can not get the consent of the Pacific States to pay more for a letter than is charged for carrying it five miles. The provisions requiring the payment of newspaper postage also failed. This failure included the proposed change in rates on daily papers which will, as heretofore, continue to pay thirty cents quarterly; weekly papers five cents.

There was attached to the postal appropriation bill the following clause: "Provided, That all laws and parts of laws permitting the transmission by mail of any free matter whatever be, and the same are hereby repealed from and after June 30, 1873."

This sweeping clause cuts off free exchanges, and also the distribution of weekly papers free in the counties where printed. Subscribers to such weeklies will, therefore, after June 30, have to pay postage on their papers, and editors will be charged with postage on all the exchanges they receive.—Washington Chronicle, 15th inst.

WESTWARD.—We learn from official reports that during 1872 over ten millions seven hundred thousand acres passed from the dominion of the government into private hands. This would make nearly seventy thousand farms of one hundred and sixty acres each, equivalent to three States the size of Massachusetts. In Kansas and Nebraska alone, over fifty million acres were made within the year under the homestead law. These entries represent a population of fifty thousand added to these two States on lands freely presented by the government, besides a large number who acquired their homes by purchase.

Letter from Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, March 18, 1873. Friend Wilbert:— 'Tis a pleasant, spring-like day that makes one wish to be in the country to hear the blue birds sing—one of those charming days that you can almost hear the grass grow! It has so far been a very peculiar March, very little real March weather, such as usually anticipates this month. It has been very dry and blustery, as a consequence soon dried up the mud, and now sends it in one's eyes in clouds of dust. Old weather prophets predict three months of dry weather, which, if so, will materially affect the price of hay, and be apt to cause a scarcity in the supply for the next year. This year, however, the springs are well filled, and we will not have a repetition of last year's trouble-dry, hot weather and a scarcity of water.

St. Patrick's Day greeted us with fine weather, the opposite of what usually is the case. The wind was high, and hats were often flying through the air or along the pavements than upon the heads of the owners. For some time our Irish citizens of Roman Catholic belief had been preparing to celebrate the day of Ireland's Patron Saint with more than their usual fervor. As a consequence, yesterday, from early dawn till late in the evening, the streets were crowded with people in every desirable style of green badges, green uniforms, &c. About 11 o'clock the procession moved, and with many others, I was greatly astonished at its appearance, and what a fine looking set of men they were in most cases.
