WESTWARD .- We learn from official reports that during 1872 over ten millions even hundred thousand acres passed from the dominon of the government into private hands. This would make nearly seventy thousand farms of one hundred and sixty acres each, equivalent to three States the size of Massachusets. In Kansas and Nebraska alone, over fifteen entries were made within the year under the homestead law. These entries represent a population of fifty thousand added to these two States on lands freely presented by the government, besides a large number who acquired their homes by purchase.
