Headquarters Military Division, New Orleans, La., Jan. 15, 1875. Received 3 a. m. To His Excellency, W. W. Belmont, Secretary of War, Washington, D. C. I have the honor to submit the following brief report of affairs as they occurred here in the organization of the state legislature on January 4th, 1875.

On the 4th of January, the general type of conversation was the scenes of bloodshed that were liable to occur on that day, and I repeatedly heard threats of assassinating the governor, and regrets expressed that he was not killed on the 14th of December last.
