A term of the "Nicholson Court of Pleas for the State of Pennsylvania," convened in the Borough of Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 20, A. D. 1841, in pursuance of an act entitled "An act to settle the estates of John Nicholson and Peter Baynton," passed April 16th, A. D. 1840. Upon the petition presented and filed in our court by Robert Orr, John Dungan and William Primrose Esqs., Commissioners appointed as provided in the act aforesaid—representing that whereas it appears from the records in the office of the Secretary of the Land Office in Pennsylvania, that William P. Brady applied for, and took out of the Land Office aforesaid, fifteen warrants, all bearing date Nov. 18, 1793, in the name of John Brady, Thomas Hamilton, William P. Brady, John Eoyl, William Wilson, Benjamin F. Young, William Gray, William Cook, Esq., John Cowden, Bernard Hubley, Thomas Grant, Alexander Hunter, Samuel Scott, James Hepburn, John Carson, and also the five following warrants, all bearing date March 14, 1794, in the names of Thomas Reese, Thomas Grant, Samuel Scott, Thomas Hamilton, Jeremiah Jackson, for four hundred acres each, adjoining each other in their programme order, returned in Northumberland County, as described and set forth in the certificates annexed to said petition, numbered 12,781 to 12,785, and also a receipt in the office of the Secretary of the Land Office, aforesaid, dated June 2, 1794, a certificate whereof is also said petition annexed, that William P. Brady paid into the Land Office aforesaid \$200 in specie, for said twenty tracts, amounting in all to 8000 acres, together with £10 office fees;—and whereas it also appears by the certificates of the said William P. Brady, legally executed and acknowledged, bearing date August 13, 1838, the same whereof is annexed to the petition, that the twenty warrants aforesaid mentioned were all paid by the said William P. Brady, as the agent of, and for the use and benefit of John Nicholson, Esq., for the sole use and benefit of said Nicholson, and was paid for with money placed in his hands for that purpose, although from the books in said Land Office, it appears that said William P. Brady received credit for the purchase money of said warrants. The petitioners further represent, that the said William P. Brady, the witness which the petitioners have for proof of the facts stated in the above bill, is now very aged and infirm, the petitioners therefore pray the Court that a rule may be granted before said Court to take the testimony of the said William P. Brady, now of the county of Indiana, and state of Pennsylvania, touching the aforesaid twenty tracts of land, on due notice thereof, to all persons interested, that the same will be entered of record in said court, at Harrisburg, and perpetuated agreeably to the direction of the Constitution of this Commonwealth, and the acts of Assembly in such case made and provided, and to make such further rules and orders here in as to the Court shall seem just and proper, &c.
Whereupon, January 20, 1841, the foregoing petition being read in open Court, and the residence of the persons interested in the lands therein mentioned not being known, the Court order and direct that a rule be entered to all parties or persons interested in said lands, to show cause before the Court to be held at Harrisburg, on the second Monday of April next, why the testimony shall not then and there be perpetuated as applied for in said petition, and the Court further order that a copy of the said rule and order be published in one day in each week for six weeks successively, and once a week for the same period in a weekly newspaper printed in Northumberland County, (where the land lies), prior to the said second Monday in April next.
