THE CAROLINE OUTRAGE AGAIN-MR. J. S. Ho-GAN IN ROCHESTER JAIL.

APRIL 1, 5 o'clock A. M. Last evening, a warrant was granted by Justice Buchan of this city, for the apprehension of John Sheridan Hogan, Esq. charged with having been one of the destroyers of the Caroline, and of the party who killed Amos Durfee and others.

Mr. Hogan whose motions are said to have been carefully watched, both here and in Canada, was speedily arrested, just as he was starting for the country in a carriage-he having arrived in the Gore a few hours before from Toronto.

He was carried before Police Justice Warner, and committed to jail for further examination till do'clock this afternoon.

Some persons expressed doubts as to whether he is really the person, as he was in some degree disguised :- but if he actually is Hogan, his participation in the Caroline Outrage is a matter of notoricty.

He behaved with spirit at the Police officeasked no favors-required no friends-but placed his trust and confidence "in the power of his country-the wooden walls of Old England"adding "my government can protect me."

But if they kept their follies to themselves, they might be suffered to call names, waste their lives in election anuables, exhaust the public resources in worthless speculation, and swallow gin and bad politics to the end of the chapter. But the evil of republics never keeps itself within native bounds. It is always boiling over on its neighbors. A field of thistles is not more obnaxious to the honest farmer, who sees their seeds floating over his fence at every gust, and preparing vexation for his harvest hour by hour.

America is now a land of Sympathizers-tender phrase! 'A nest of cut-threats starts up in Canada. All is sympathy for thum at the other side of the St. Lawrence. A horde of ruffians starts up in heland, rosting for the Repeal of the Union, which every man of common sense must know to be only preliminary to the separation of the empire, and scenes of unparalleled bloodshed and misery, if not the signal-for an universal war. America instantly exhibits her Sympathies. We are at peace with her, we have offered no provocation, she is bound to us by solemn treaties,-but what are all those things to a "free and enlightened people?" All these gatherings of rabile erators, pour out, in her public places, the most furious declamations against our country. But does her government ever interfere; does she ever protest against these violences; do any of her public organa point out to these hawling incendiaries the injustice, the fartilessness, and the atrocity of their uproar ! No. A-republican government is always a government of tools,

and the government leaves the mischief to take its !

If we are disposed to throw back reproaches there would be no lack of matter in the way of retaliation as a rejoinder to this abuse The interference of British abolitionists has gone farther in meddling with our domestic concerns than any movements on the part of our people in the affairs of Ireland. British emissaries have visited the United States to stir up divisions amongst us; they have leagued with demestic agitators; and one of these foreign envoys had the assurance to offer a memorial to the President of the United States on a subject which no foreigner has a right to touch. The World Convention at London was presided over by no less a personage than Prince ALBERT, husband of the Queen of England; and in that Convention the delegates of American abolitionists sat side by side with British sympathisers, and joined in the sbuse of their own country which poured from the tips of their foreign co-adjutors.

What bounds would be set to the furious wrath of British Tories if emissaries from the United States should go to England, as agents of a great association hose, to stimulate the efforts of the Chartists, to expose the tyrappy of the Corn Laws. to aggravate the bitter feelings of the poor ishour ing classes in Great Britain, bowed down and trampled on as they are under the feet of aristocratic oppressors? The system of domestic slavery existing in the U. States, when considered in view of the characteristic of the race who are subject to it, is not a system of hardship-that class could hold no other relation in this country, consistently with their own good and the common welfare The system of servitude in Great Britain is one of hardship, and there is no distinction of races in the case to tender its continuance necessary.
