

From the Baltimore American. TWENTY SEVENTH CONGRESS. WASHINGTON, Aug. 29, 1842. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The Journal of proceedings having been read, there was a rush for the door, and the first effort was to adopt a Resolution allowing extra compensation to the chaplains of the two Houses of Congress. The resolution was not adopted for want of time to consider it.
