He was aware of the latitude of the law and, the amount of punishment that the Court could inflict, but he would depart from the u-ual custom of craving the lensty of the Court, as he was innocent of the charges found against him, and therefore scorn the act; he reorganized but one judgment seat of mercy; that was above, where he should have an impartial trial, and he was fearless, of the result; it was immuterial to him as far a-regarded self, if his sentence was one hour or a thousand years; death even had no terrors for him; his only consideration was, that his sentence might cast ignomy on his

Judge Kent stated that the Court had intended to have proceeded to pass scotence without a sin-"Female Industry. - A quit has recently bales by the great fire in Liverpool produced no cf. gle comment, but since the prisoner had thought proper to make so singular an exhibition, he was compelled to make a few remarks; he had been tried fairly, and a jury had decided that he was a person obnoxlous to society, and the laws, therefore, had decided to expel him therefrom. The Judge stated that a bold attempt had been made on his trial of subproation of perjury, which fortunately had been defeated.

The Judge haped that his moral character would We learn from the Presbyterian Almanac for be redeemed by the sentence about to be passed, and that he would hereafter become a useful member of society. He was at present, as was clearly proven, destitute of mor I principle, and by the sentence tie was about to pronounce, his character would be stamped in the prime of life, with ignominy-all that was therefore left for the Court, was to pronounce sentence, that he be confined in the State Prison for the term of ten years, being five years for each conviction.

During the remarks of the Judge, the prisoner more than once stated that he asked not for the clemency of the Court-and perhaps never in a Court of Justice was there exhibited such a specimen of a total want of moral feeling, and of reckless deprayiticut :- The Nutney State. Where shall we tr. The prisoner heard the sentence with a smith. and left the room apparently in high glee.
