

Correspondence of the American.

HARRISBURG, Jan. 26, 1843. DEAR SIR:—Since my last, the great assembly for the spoils has terminated. The Prayers for the Senate and House have been elected. Thus one more vexed question has been settled. The following is the result:

For Printers to the House: English Journal, McKinley and Lescaze; German Journal, Huter and Bigler; Bilk, J. H. Stock.

For Printers to the Senate: English Journal, J. B. Bratton; German Journal, Baab and Hummel; Bilk, John H. Dimmock & Co.

Gen. Cass arrived here some days since, and was escorted by the military to Wilson's Hotel. A brilliant levee was given at the Governor's mansion, the second evening of his arrival, at which Gen. Cass and family, Gen. Brown of Michigan, Com. Elliot and daughter, the beauty and fashion of Harrisburg, members of the departments and legislature, and numerous strangers, were present.

A bill was run through both Houses on Saturday the 21st, to prevent incorporated improvement companies from making assignments in favor of loan-holders, and giving contractors and mechanics a lien on all such works, to come in first for payment. This was done for the purpose of preventing the Reading and Philadelphia rail road company from making an assignment in favor of certain loan-holders on Monday, the 22d, which is said to be in progress of consummation. The Governor has signed the law.

In the Senate, on Tuesday last, Mr. Gibbons reported a bill adverse to the repeal of the Bankrupt law. The law has already done nearly all the mischief to be complained of, and should not now be entirely repealed.

The subject of cancelling the Relief notes is probably the most important subject before the legislature. A resolution to that effect has already passed the House. On Thursday last the subject was taken up in the Senate. The question recurring shall the main question be now put, it was decided in the affirmative, yeas 19, nays 14, and the resolution passed second reading by the following vote:

The resolution now coming up for final passage, a motion was made by Mr. Champneys, again to go into committee of the whole for the purpose of amendment. The amendments were submitted and read, and after some debate, the subject was postponed for the purpose of having the amendments printed. The object of this resolution is, to restore the provisions of the act of 24th June, and provides that all the Relief notes received in the Treasury shall be cancelled, until the full amount ordered by that act is destroyed; the effect of which will be virtually to banish the whole issue from circulation.

In regard to the presidency, there is evidently a deep game playing between Van Buren and Buchanan. The delegates from Van Buren will be, ostensibly, for Buchanan, but as his chance for a nomination is but feeble, they are to go for Van Buren. Had Mr. Buchanan taken a more independent course in regard to the Tariff, he would have been the most popular candidate in the state. He voted, it is true, for the tariff, but destroyed the effect of his vote by an apologetic speech. Pennsylvania, unless she intends to lagar herself, will never support the free trade system.
