FLOUR.—On Saturday a sale of 200 bbls. Susquehanna was made at \$5.62, and to-day another parcel of 200 bbls. was sold at \$5.75. A lot of fresh ground Susquehanna, of a favorite brand, is held at \$6.

GRAIN.—Wheat has further advanced. On Saturday a lot of 500 bushels Penna. red was sold at 118 cts. To-day several parcels of good to prime Pennsylvania red were sold at 119 to 122 cts. Several small parcels of Md. reds were sold to-day at 90 to 116 cts, according to quality. Sales to-day of Md. Corn at 54 cts for yellow; and 55 cts for white. Several thousand bushels Penna. yellow Corn were sold on Saturday and to-day at 51. We quote Md. Oats at 26 to 27 cts, as in quality.
