At a large and respectable meeting of the Democratic citizens of Coal township, Northumberland county, assembled on the 4th of September, pursuant to a previous notice, at the School House in the town of Shamokin, S. S. BIRD, Esq. was called to the chair, and J. K. ROBISS, appointed Secretary. The object of the meeting being stated by the chairman, and the appointment of a committee on resolutions moved, the chair appointed Messrs. Wm. Fageley, S. Bittenbender and J. Zimmerman said committee, who after retiring a short time reported the following, which were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, we, as citizens of the United States, do consider it the duty as well as privilege of every qualified citizen to exercise the elective franchise independent of party, at all elections for public officers; but, in performing that duty, we cannot give our support to the present nominee for the Assembly, because we believe there are other equally capable men in our country, that will serve if elected, who are not trammeled with party prejudice—and it is from such men that we can most reasonably expect impartial legislation for the good of the whole community, instead of a party. Therefore

Resolved, That we recommend to the voters of Northumberland county, our fellow townsman, KIMBER CLEAVER, as a candidate for assembly at the ensuing election, he being a man of ability, good moral character, and industrious business habits, and free from violent party prejudice. This we speak from experience of several years' acquaintance with Mr. Cleaver, as a citizen of our place.

Resolved, That we give Kimber Cleaver our support at the polls, and use every honorable means in our power to ensure his election.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be signed by the presiding officers, and published in the newspapers of the county.
