

Unrobing a Swindler.
A singular scene was witnessed in Baltimore, on Saturday last, as we learn from the Sun. A person met another in one of the most public places, and accosted him thus—"Sir, you must either pay me the money for that suit of clothes you have on, or I will have the clothes. You can, perhaps, whip me, but I will tear the clothes off you." This speech attracted the attention of bystanders, when the gentleman spoken to appealed to the other not to expose him. "I will go with you," and away they went together. Upon inquiry, we learned that this scene was occasioned by the following circumstances. An individual, who gave his name as Horace J. Hill, commission merchant and ship broker, No. 6 Bowley's wharf, corner of Wood street, Baltimore, called upon Mr. Thaddeus Mabee, tailor, and obtained from him a suit of clothes, directing them to be sent to his store. Mr. M. himself, went with the clothes, and as every thing appeared right, he left the garments. No pay came forth, and Mr. Horace J. Hill in a few days could not be found, until he was recognized on Saturday. The conversation upon recognition has been given above, or something like it. Arrived at the store, the quasi commission merchant was stripped, and supplied with a round-about and pantaloons, a little the worse for wear, with which he made his exit.

EUGENE SUE.—Eugene Sue has gone to London to collect materials for a new work to be called "Mistress de Londres." The demand for the "Mistress de Paris" continues unabated—50,000 having been sold in Paris alone. He received 15,000 francs from the Journal des Debats for permitting the work to be printed in its columns, and 50,000 francs for the copyright—making 65,000 francs, (over \$12,000) for a single work. But he is, notwithstanding, deeply in debt, as he spends enormous sums with his mistresses, one of whom is the "Mistress de Paris" as the Marquise d'Harville, as well as his intimate friend Lord Seymour, as Rodolphe.

A HORRIBLE MONSTER.—The Paris papers contain appalling lists of murders and suicides, and of attempts to commit those crimes. At St. Denis, a monster of Herculean strength, seized upon an unoffending young man, and throwing him down on the road, held him firmly until the wheels of an approaching wagon had passed over his head.
