

From the N. O. Picayune, 9th inst. Important from Mexico—Revolution at last in Warlike.

By the Mexican schooner Jaquins. Martinez, master, which left Tampico on the 1st inst. we have late and important intelligence from Mexico.

The revolution in progress commenced with the 'Army of Reserve' stationed at San Luis Potosi. The agitation and ferment preliminary to an outbreak, probably gave occasion to the rumor which was in circulation in Vera Cruz on the 1st Dec.

The manifesto alleges that the existing Administration, from which a year since all hoped so well, had conducted the government to the very brink of a precipice; that it had established the most preposterous theories upon which to administer internal affairs; that it sought to get rid of a war, necessary and glorious in itself by concessions injurious to the national dignity.

A guard of twenty-five armed men was placed in charge of the prisoner, and the assemblage then dispersed to meet again on the following day, and enact the last scene of this sad tragedy.

Thus we have given a plain statement of facts, which it is painful to record. However guilty Yoermans may have been, or however worthy of death, the deliberate refusal to give him a trial in the regularly constituted Court, before an impartial Judge and jury of his country, when the laws were capable of reaching and punishing his crimes, was a fearful stab at the Constitution and laws of the country.

Let every good citizen remember that if such lawless violence is to be tolerated in our country, the bloodbought freedom of our fathers, the protection of our Constitution and laws, and the sacred rights of individual liberty and property are all a mockery.

On Saturday night, the 27th ult. Yoermans was arrested a few miles below the place, obtained a release under a writ of habeas corpus, was re-arrested, and finally delivered up on Thursday last to the association of citizens who offered the reward in November last.
