**ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP GREAT WESTERN.**  
Eleven Days Later from Europe.

The steamship Great Western arrived at New York this (Monday) morning, having left Liverpool on the 30th ult., with news eleven days later from Europe.

The news she brings is interesting and important. The steamship Cambria had arrived out with the news of a Declaration of war against Mexico by the United States government, and passage of the bill to raise 50,000 volunteers. This news produced a great sensation in England, and the sympathy of the British public was altogether in favor of Mexico, as the weaker party, though in the war of invasion against the poor Sikhs the same public had very little sympathy to throw away notwithstanding the weakness and inferiority of the Sikh government compared with the power of England.

The Great Western, it is stated, in the English papers upon the best authority, brings out the answer of the British Government to the notice of the passage of the Oregon resolutions, and that it is of a conciliatory character.

Great rejoicings had taken place in consequence of the successful termination of an event annually expected. Queen Victoria has given birth to another daughter, which announcement was received as usual with demonstrations of joy and gratitude. The Queen is "doing as well" as can be expected. The event occurred on the 23d.

The excitement in reference to the Corn Bill still existed. The measure may be considered as safe. It has passed the House of Lords on second reading by a majority of 47. The London Sun says nothing whatever can prevent the triumphant settlement of the Corn bill.

The fate of the Irish Coercion bill is sealed. Lord George Bentine has declared that the great body of the Agricultural members are opposed to its future progress.

The Corn market was depressed, and transactions in the Grain market limited. The King and Queen of France are expected to visit England early in July.

**ESCAPE OF LOUIS BRONAPARTE FROM HAM.**—On Monday last, the Prince succeeded in effecting his escape from the Fortress of Ham, after a close imprisonment of some years; having assumed the disguise of a workman, he contrived to elude the vigilance of the sentries to regain his freedom, without any molestation from the battalion of infantry that formed the garrison of the Castle, and to arrive safely in London, where we believe he is at present.

The Morning Herald says as the Prince escaped at 7 o'clock of the morning of the 25th, and as the event was not discovered for 10 hours afterwards, he could easily have reached the Belgian frontiers, only 20 leagues distant, long before the Telegraph itself could have been set to work. The papers say he embarked at the Valery.

**DESTINY OF THE CAVALRY.—CALIFORNIA TO BE TAKEN.**—We find the following in the last Nashville Union: "We understand from a reliable source, that it is the intention of the Government to send a force to take possession of that country and to hold on to it. It is supposed that the mounted men from Arkansas, Missouri, and probably from Tennessee, will be directed to California. We sincerely hope that this information be true, and from the source through which it is derived, we are satisfied that it is reliable. We regard California now as ours, and with that result all will be satisfied."

**CALIFORNIA.**—The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia U. S. Gazette writes: "You are aware that orders were some time ago sent to Col. Kearny, of the dragoons, to put himself at the head of a body of dragoons and mounted riflemen, and take up his line of march for Santa Fe, and it is supposed he will then be ordered into California. But his presence there will not be necessary, if what I learn be true, and I have it from the best authority, namely, that the emigrants who have lately gone from Missouri to Oregon and California, number one thousand men rank and file, and are regularly organized into a regiment of mounted men—riflemen, as every man at least has his rifle."
