

A parley was held, which regulted in a demand that the Mormons and all in the city engaged in the troubles, should leave Nauroo within five days, and at once deliver their persone, arms, ammunition, and the city itself, into the hands of the Anti-Mormons.

The Mormoos were all leaving Nauvon, and arriving at St. Louis in a destitute state ; fears were entertained that many would starve if not relieved by public charity. The terms of the capitulation had been complied with by the Anti-Mormond.

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
