WASHINGTON, Jan. 2, 1847. Since I last wrote to you, political prospects begin to loom out, and parties begin to acquire some consistency.

The Lieutenant Generalship is still the absorbing political topic of the day, little else being talked of but that, and the compliments of the season being now already pretty well forgotten.

There is no doubt, whatever, that the message for creating such a rank in the U. S. Army has been prepared ever since last Tuesday, and that the Senate has been pulled to ascertain whether a majority of votes may be had in favor of the measure.

The opposition some eight or ten days ago, were partially in favor of it; but, on sober reflection, orders were received not to yield an inch; and they will, accordingly, oppose the measure like one man.

So much for the Senate, in which body the measure is viewed more favorably than in the House of Representatives. In the latter a strong opposition seems to be organizing; but with what effect remains, as yet, to be seen.

The only difficulty seems to be the manner in which these gentlemen have committed themselves as regards the boundary of Texas, and the possibility of the Mexican Commissioners appealing to their own opinions pronounced in Congress.

The resolutions which passed the House today in regard to the proposed duty on sugar and coffee, are, perhaps, the most important ever, since the meeting of Congress.

The Coal Trade.—The Reading Railroad Company sent 1,233,551 tons over the road last year, being only 16,438 tons less than the managers estimated the capacity of the road.

Wisconsin.—The State Convention in Wisconsin has decided to extend the right of suffrage to all foreign born residents of the Territory without requiring them to swear allegiance to the United States.

The Senate was not in session to-day, having on Thursday adjourned over to Monday. In the House, the first business in order was the resolution to prevent members from making excuses for not voting.

The States were then called in order for resolutions, and a great number were offered, chiefly unimportant. Among those offered, were resolutions—To inquire into the expediency of setting apart a tract of land in Oregon for the Indians west of the Rocky Mountains.

To inquire into the expediency of reducing the pay of members of Congress, and others, twenty-five per cent, during the continuance of the war. Of inquiry, whether the money bequeathed by James Smithson was in the treasury on the 1st January, 1847.

To inquire into the expediency of imposing an ad valorem tax on gold and silver plate, &c. Calling on the Secretary of the Treasury for information as to whether secret travelling agents are or have been employed by the department, and paid from the treasury.

Of inquiry, relative to the trial and execution of seamen on board ship Cumberland. Calling on the Secretary of War to report how many regiments have been employed near the mouth of the Rio Grande since the commencement of the war, the number of deaths, number discharged, &c.

For printing 10,000 copies of the Report of the Secretary of the Treasury on Commerce and Navigation. Relative to the better organization of the militia of the United States.

A series, in regard to the war, its causes and objects. The bill to increase the pay of the army of the United States was made the special order for Tuesday next.

The bill for the better organization of the army—raising ten additional regiments—was made the special order for Monday. Mr. Wentworth offered a resolution, declaring that it is inexpedient to levy a duty on tea and coffee.

Mr. Sims, of Missouri, offered a resolution, declaring that the people of the United States are too patriotic to refuse any necessary tax in time of war. Mr. Rathbun moved to lay the resolution on the table; motion lost, 22 to 107.

Death Preferred to Imprisonment Non-Resistant.—Our readers will recollect that Governor Dix commuted the sentence of Robt. Rowland, who was recently condemned to be hung for the murder of his brother-in-law, Franklin Barker, in Mansfield, to solitary confinement in the Penitentiary for life.
