WASHINGTON, Jan. 2, 1917. Since I last wrote to you, political prospects begin to loom out, and parties begin to acquire some consistency. The great move on the political chessboard is to be made in the course of a few days, and the preparatory steps have already been taken.

The Lieuteuant Genéralship is still the absorbing political topic of the day, little else being talked of but that, and the compliments of the season being now already pretty well forgotten. The weather was remarkably propititous, and Pennsylvania Avenue presented quite an animated scene till a very late hour in the eve-
