HARRISBURG, Feb. 22, 6 o'clock.

The Governor has nominated Wm D Kelley, of Philadelphia, as an Associate Judge, in the room of J. Richter Jones, whose term is about expiring.

The Native American Convention nominated Manuel C. Reigart as the candidate for Governor and Robert H. Morton for Canal Commissioner, both on the first ballot.

According to an official statement of Postmaster General Wickliff made to the Senate in 1814, upwards of four millions of franked documents, weighing many tons daily, were sent out from Washington in the course of three weeks! And doubtless the average number has much increased since.

BRADSTEPS.—The capacity of the United States for supplying the wants of Great Britain with breadstuffs, is shown in an estimate contained in a statistical article published in the New York Express. It makes the surplus of wheat and Indian corn for export to be—Wheat 3,000,000 bushels; Flour, 3,500,000 barrels; Indian corn and meal, 17,000,000 bushels.

SELF-PATRONAGE.—The Boston Times says that each member of the Legislature is allowed fourteen newspapers per week during the session, and that Mr. Keyes, the whig member elect from Dedham, and editor and proprietor of the Norfolk County American, subscribes for thirteen copies per week of his own paper!

About one hundred merchant ships are now in the employ of the General Government, all chartered for two and three months.
