The immense amount of bread stuffs imported into Great Britain has drawn heavily on their specie. About 25 mil lions of dollars have been exported to this country. The Bank of England, fearing that such heavy drains might lead to a suspension, has raised the rate of interest to nearly double its former rate, causing much tightness and scarcity in the money market, and consequently many

The correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger, writing from Camp near Jalapa, speaks thus of the Pennsylvania Regiments : In speaking of Cerro Gordo, I am reminded that

the first Pennsylvania Regiment, and, indeed, the whole of Pillow's brigade, has been grossly misrepresented in some of the unofficial reports of that battle. The American Star, a paper started in Jalana on Sunday last, states, in its accounts of the battle, that General Pillow's brigade "retreated," and in an editorial it says that the "brigade made a gallant charge upon a fortification of the enemy, but from its length-being assisted by a fort on the left and right-he was forced to give way, after sustaining a heavy loss, and before he could renew the attack, the enemy had surrendered." Now, the truth of the matter is, that the brigade neither retreated nor was it who were in the first line of attack with the first Pennsylvanians, were the only part of the briwhich we had all taken at first and had been are so charge from the General, who could not have known their position, as the chapparel is dense and the paths obscure. They did charge, under every disadvantage and in the worst place, and after losing nearly a fourth of their number in killed and wounded, fell back on the main road. The rest of the brigade, composed of the two Pennsylvania and first Tennessee regiments, moved to the second position to which they were ordered, and halted for the order to charge in front of the batteries and exposed to their fire.

The conduct of the whole brigade was conl and soldierly, and well deserves the title of "gallant." That of the first Pennsylvania, who were nearest to the forts, was as orderly as that of a hattalion on drill. The fire poured upon them was terrific, and yet scarcely a man wavered, and all rushed up the hills with a shout and a bound, and took their stand upon the top, impatient to hear the word "charge." Col. Wynkoop was exceedingly anxious to move upon the enemy's works at once, and I heard him exclaim, as he sent a request to General Pillow to permit him to advance, "If I don't get an order of some sort in less than half an hour, I will tharge on my own responsibility, by Heaven !"
