He states that he himself had cattle to the number of 600 head, besides maize and flour, of which he apprised Santa Anna. He further asserts that the latter's retreat was unjustible; that the manner of it was still more so -moving off in the darkness of the night, and leaving hundreds of his poor wounded soldiers to their fate on the field-more like a fugitive hiding from his enemy, than a General retiring to recruit his forces .- It was to prevent these facts from being made public that he, Gen. Minon, was persecuted, imprisoned, and denied communication with his friends. Truth will out, it appears, and Santa Anna will shrink into a pigmy, by and by, from the inflated dimensions he gave himself as the Napoleon of the West .- N. O.
