

THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CONFERENCE.

We have been favored with a copy of the minutes of the Philadelphia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which terminated its labors on Tuesday, the 14th ult. We learn that 13 preachers have been admitted on trial, that 9 remain on trial, that 8 have been admitted into full connexion, that 8 elders have been elected and ordained this year, that there are 12 supernumerary preachers, and that only one clergyman, the Rev. Joseph Russling has died during the year.

The Conference contains within its limits, 34,070 white members, 8,669 colored. Increase during the year, 2101 white, and 339 colored. The Conference collection for superannuated preachers, amount to \$1866 57. The 10 cent collections to \$675 92. The additional collections for necessitous cases, to \$886 71. We give the names of the preachers and their stations, for the two districts of Philadelphia—North and South.

A SHOCKING OUTRAGE.—The Mobile Chronicle states that an atrocious act was recently perpetrated on board the steam-boat Governor Pickens, when twenty miles above that city. G. B. Hayden, Esq. editor of the Marengo Patriot, was shot and dangerously wounded by a person named Gee, a fellow passenger who we understand resides in Gamesville in this state. The circumstance is as far as we have been able to gather them they are as follows: The boat left this city late on Saturday evening, Mr. Hayden repaired to the boiler deck, where seated in a circle of friends, he was engaged in a political conversation. While this was going on, Gee obtruded himself, and commenced using very abusive language, bantering Mr. H. to bet, to fight, &c. Mr. H. did all in his power to evade the conversation, remarking that he did not wish to bet or fight and desired him to leave him. After sitting a few moments, Mr. H. arose for the purpose of retiring to the ladies' cabin, to join his wife, who was also on board. As soon as he rose, Gee drew a pistol and shot Mr. H., the ball lodging, we understand

in the hip bone. Gee was immediately secured by the passengers, and the boat put back bringing both the wounded man and Gee to this city. Surgical aid was immediately procured for Mr. Hayden and although the wound is pronounced rather dangerous, still hopes are entertained of his recovery. Gee was promptly committed to prison. We have never heard of a more wanton, cold blooded attempt at murder than this, as presented to us. Mr. Hayden is a young and is much beloved by a numerous circle of friends and acquaintance.

THE NORTH EAST BOUNDARY QUESTION.—In the course of a debate in the House of Commons, Lord John Russel alluded to the Boundary Question, and said their were two separate and distinct questions involved in these discussions with the United States.—The first had reference to the boundary and the other to the agreement which had been entered into pending the negotiations; and he did not think that either on the general question, or on the question of agreement, a serious quarrel would take place; nor did he in the least degree anticipate that the harmony of the two countries is likely to be interrupted.—The Governments of both countries are too sensible of the advantages of peace to wish for its termination, and both were perfectly convinced their were nothing in the boundary question which could not be amicably arranged if both parties were determined to abide by the principles of justice.
