The Doguehonda Improvement Company will, during this week, have an engine on their railroad, and will commence the shipment of coal, provided the market warrants. There are several incorporated coal companies now at work building roads to connect, which will cause a large trade over the above road. We like this, and hope, as we are justified in doing, that the transportation of many thousand tons of coal, as also many million feet of lumber, will bring large returns to our county, as well as a merited remuneration to the projectors and owners of the road.

COLORADO.—An idea of the value of some claims (100 feet each), in this district, may be formed when the fact is considered, that it often occurs that they yield millions of dollars, and have in several instances been sold for \$25,000 per foot. Mr. Fields, from 334 feet of the Bobtail Lode has taken out already over \$200,000 in gold, and \$266,000 has been offered and refused for 334 feet of this same lode, equal to \$800,000 for a claim of 100 feet.
