**FUN AT HOME.**—Don't be afraid of little fun at home. Don't shut your eyes and your hearts, lest a hearty laugh strike down some of the musty old cobwebs there! **THE LATE ELECTION.**—In explanation of the delay in publishing the official returns entire of the State, at the late election, it is due to the Secretary of the Commonwealth to explain that several counties have not made their returns, because the Return Judges thereof had adjourned over to the 26th inst., the period fixed for receiving the returns of the vote in the army. Such Return Judges have been instructed by the proper officers here, that they can make a return of the home vote before they receive the soldiers' vote, which later return can be made as provided by law, separately and afterwards.

There are hundreds, if not thousands, of soldiers, citizens of Pennsylvania, still in the military service of the government, whose votes may give a different aspect to close results in localities, and affect the decision of many wagers on the election, involving large sums of money.

**RADICALISM AND REVOLUTION.**—We have good reason to believe, our authority being one of the first men in Connecticut, that Ferry, Secretary of the United States Senate, and editor of the Washington Chronicle and Philadelphia Press, is writing to the Radical governors of the States to be ready to march State troops into Maryland, and put down Governor Swann by force of arms, in case he should think proper, after hearing and trial, to remove the partisan Police Commissioners of Baltimore, for violation of the law.

Such a letter, we are assured, has been sent to Governor Hawley, of Connecticut. We should be glad to know that the statement is not true, and still more gratified to believe, on authority, there would be no response to a call so uncalculated, illegal and revolutionary in its purpose—but these vile men, who have lived and thriven upon the horrors of war, and who are ready to sacrifice right, reason, and liberty, and every body's property but their own, to the passions of the hour, are ripe and ready for the worst that can be contemplated, and it becomes all Conservative men to be on the watch for this threatened demonstration.—*N. **IN A HURRY.**—A curious wedding is reported to have taken place some days since near Bay City, Michigan, which reads like this: It seems that a farmer lost his wife by death, and that said wife died early in the morning. The farmer did not appreciate being left alone in the world, and ere his wife's eyes had hardly closed in the sleep that knows no waking, he determined to marry again. Hitching up his team, he takes his servant girl and goes to Bay City to buy partners for the dead. While there he married the girl and returned to his home the same night with his second wife, so that by actual count he was not a widower twelve hours. The new wife appeared at the funeral the next day in deep black, and was one of the principal mourners over the body of the first wife.

The skiff contained ordinary cooking utensils, a rifle, a long gun, pistol, and also a little dog, a special favorite.

**Address of the Democratic State Committee.**

 To the Democracy of Pennsylvania:

In the poll of more than six hundred and ten thousand votes, you are beaten less than three per cent. on the whole. A change of one and half per cent. would have given you the State. You have reduced the majority of your opponents, and polled nearly twenty thousand more votes than ever before. Up on the aggregate of the Congressional vote, still greater force is shown.

In this contest you have proven your devotion to principle, have demonstrated the strength of your organization, and yield to your enemy a dearly bought victory.

A band of men, who, in 1863, can poll for their candidate 254,000 votes; in 1864, 279,000 votes, and in 1866, 295,000 votes; who plant themselves upon principles that are eternal; who will not despair of the Republic, and who possess the physical power and the moral courage to maintain their opinions and preserve their liberties, must eventually be the ruling power in the State.

Implicit belief in the justice and truth of the great doctrines that lie at the base of our form of government, aversion to its centralization, and confidence in the efficiency of the Constitution for the preservation of your liberties, have ever distinguished you.

These are the magnets around which you have gathered in many a hard-fought contest, and to them you will be true as the needle of the pole. Opinions of individuals may change; but, in the future as in the past, come victory or defeat, as a party you will ever be found rallying to these principles as the leading tenets of your political faith.

Hope, confidence and courage should be gathered from the remembrance, that two-thirds of the white freemen of the Republic think as you do upon these subjects, and that, on every field on which they are staked, your united action will overcome all opposing forces.

We ask you to persevere in the work so auspiciously begun. From this hour, let us determine to go forward. Let us have done with spasmodic efforts, and move onward with unflinching energy. The thorough and effectual dissemination of truth, is the proper means to your eventual triumph; and organization, discipline, systematic effort and individual exertion, are the avenues that lead to victory. Will you pursue them? United, disciplined and determined, you will be irresistible.

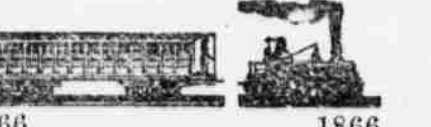
