

Shot in St. Mary's.

A riot of a very serious nature, occurred in St. Mary's, Pa., on the 1st of the present month. It seems that while the citizens, with but very few exceptions were in Church, it being "all Saints' day," a party of men, some four or five, from Sinnamahoning, were in the bar room of the Alpine House, behaving in a boisterous manner. The bartender was afraid to refuse them liquor, and both he and Mr. Kreitz, the landlord, believed that they would soon leave peacefully. That however was not the intention of the parties, who finally became so boisterous that Mr. Kreitz ejected them and locked up the house. The rioters returned in about five minutes with quite a large number of men who, ranging themselves around the porches of the hotel, called upon Major Kreitz to come out and fight them. Major K. with Major Burke appeared on the porches and warned the parties to retire peacefully; to which they replied by hooting, yelling, cursing and the vilest language, and proceeded to put into execution a previously declared threat "to take charge of the town." The battering of the P. & E. track furnished them ample aggressive means, and a perfect shower of stones was hurled at the house, smashing windows, doors and furniture, and endangering the inmates. Several endeavored to break open the doors, and swore they would smash the heads of the inmates to a jelly, &c. By this time, however, the citizens in Church had been notified, and when they came to the scene of the disgraceful riot, the rioters dispersed. Five of them were subsequently arrested. These, Griffin, Dennis McCarthy, Timothy McCarthy, Sylvester Hennion and a man, who gave his name as John Kelly, but whose real name is Smith. At the present session of Court, the grand jury returned true a bill against them, for riot &c., and assault with intent to kill Mr. Kreitz. The case was called for trial. Thursday last, John G. Hall, Esq. for defense, moved the Court to direct a *non prosequi* to be entered, and Geo. P. Jenkins, Esq., counsel for Mr. Kreitz, said the latter gentleman would be satisfied with the Court so directing. District Attorney Blakely, said he thought the case was one which called for a trial in every view he could take in the case, and he wished it understood the *non prosequi* was not entered upon his motion, but he thought a trial should be had. The Court said, it was so understood, and directed the defendants give security in the sum of \$300 each, which being done, with payment of costs, they were discharged.

DARING ROBBERY.—On last Friday morning the bandit house of Souther, Willis & Souther, in this place, was entered by some person or persons. To effect the entrance they first went to the saw mill of J. S. Hyde, on Mill street, and there procured a heavy iron bar and another instrument, commonly called a mill dog; they then went to Belnap's blacksmith shop and there procured a heavy iron sledge and a cold chisel. It is probable they then went to the bank to complete their nefarious work. It seems that these thieves were well acquainted with the surroundings, as they went to a rear door to effect an entrance into the bank. They plied their instruments and were soon inside. But now came the main difficulty—they were in the bank, but there, barring them in the face stood an enormous Valentine & Butler's Alum Patent Fire and Burglar Proof Safe—which only to such men would seem impossible to enter. First, the safe was plated with hardened steel, about three quarters of an inch in thickness on the outside doors. Then came a layer of compounded alum, the purpose of which is to render the safe fire-proof. By means of a drill or punch they got a hole through this outside door, and then poured in their powder, and set their fuse in the hole thus made. It is probable that they then retired to some convenient locality to await the result of the explosion, which we understand was heard by several persons, but they paid no attention to it, nor dreaming of the cause of it. After the explosion had taken place, and when they had returned, they were no doubt amazed to find that their work was not half completed. There lay around them the scattered fragments of one of the outside doors. But there was the inside door—the strong box—which resisted all their efforts. Time was probably now precious, and the gathered up what money they could find in the drawers beneath the safe, and decamped, since which time there has been nothing heard or seen of them.

The amount of money taken was about \$300, part of which was in revenue stamps. The loss of the firm, in effecting the repairs to be put on their safe, will not exceed \$100. We think the safe has paid for itself, anyhow.
