It is a mat. ter of very little consequence whether the thermometer is at zero, or a hundred above in the shade. A paper must be issued for the perusal of its patrons, who may hap are leisurely reclining from the excessive heat, and whose natural debility is a very ample apolony for such re. ercation. The compositor must toil and perspire at hi. daily avocation, and for every word he composes, a drop of steaming perspiration cozes from his body. In the morning he manages to keep cool, at noon he is wasting in the hot and blistering atmosphere, and at evening he is still at his case. This may seem all very easy for the reader, but the labor is of no orcinary nature, nor the fatigue by any means light,The day's work over, he retires, perhaps to sleep, but more likely to pass a restless night, and when the sun again peeps forth, he must up and away to his work Day in and day out this is his usual routine. No change, no diversion from his established course. They who pea ruse their morning news over a cup of coffee, think but little of this. They often grumble it so be they do not get their paper, or there is a lack of news, but they forget that with the thermome. ter varying between 90 and 100, it is a matter of some labor to furnish a variety of news for the quiet and peaceful citi zen who looks for so much from the printer. Think of this kind patrons, and exhibit more forbearance.
