It is now certain that we are to have an extensive steam tannery in Ridgway. Mr. O. B. Grant, one of the firm, is now here engaged in the purchase of hemlock lands, and has already secured quite a number of pieces. The tannery is to be located, we understand, below the saw-mill of Judge Dickinson, at the western end of our village. The erection of this tannery will make things quite lively in our town, and we hope the projectors of the enterprise will meet with such success which will amply repay them. Mr. Grant is also making preparations for the early erection of buildings next spring.

ST. MARY'S.—During a recent visit to this prosperous borough, we were struck with its businesslike appearance. In almost every part of the town could be seen evidences of its onward march in improvement. Business of all kinds seemed to be brisk. The stores are well filled with desirable goods. The different hotels were well filled with guests, and we do not know when we have seen so many people in one place with so little rowdyism, &c. A splendid hardware establishment has been lately started in the store formerly occupied by Coyne and McVean, by a couple of merchants from Warren, Pa. But it would be losing our time and space to enumerate. St. Mary's is one of the most prosperous towns in the State—a nice place to live in, healthy in all respects, and what is better than all is Democratic to the back bone. In the immediate vicinity of the town are two collieries, employing some 250 hands. In the northwestern part of the town is situated the Young Ladies' Seminary, under the care of the Benedictine Sisters, an institution widely known and well patronized, and said to be one of the best in the State. We suppose there are 2,500 inhabitants within the Borough limits, and the township (Benzinger) contains about 5,000.
