Arnett Probed in scandal

At Ford, "Quality is Job #1." At Penn State-Behrend, recruiting at any cost is "Job #1". This was discovered following an audit of the SGA treasurer's records.

Bill Meelader, an auditor representing State College's Office of Addition and Subtraction, could not be reached for comment, but his assistant, Hugh B. Filled, did release this written statement.

"On March 8, 1993, Mr. Meelader had begun to conduct the usual annual audit of the Student Government Association's balance ledger when he discovered receipts and documents reflecting the purchase of a 1992 Ford Probe. Vogan started his racing career quite by accident. "I was gettin' chased by some cops one night in my 1972 Cutlass and I out ran

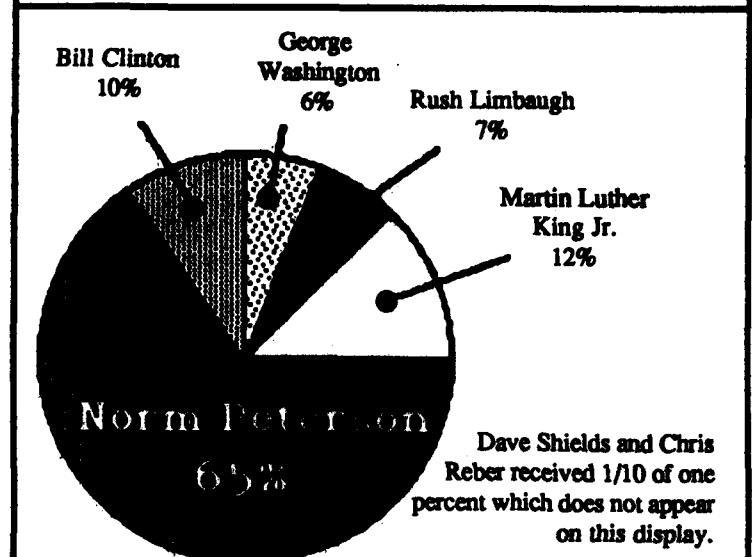
'em. "Torque" saw me and he caught up to me, and asked if I wanted to race for Behrend. I said 'Hell yes'," said Vogan.
