## Lions' season winding down

After a recent turnaround in play, the Behrend men's basketball team has hit a rough road. Starting with their game on February 9 with Daemen, the Lions have dropped two of their last three games.

The Lions got their lone win of the slump against Keuka on February 13. The Lions outplayed Keuka, 13-9, in nearly all aspects of the game.

The Lions got the advantage early on as they raced out to a 42-34 halftime lead on 50% shooting.

Keuka battled back as they tied to get back in the game in a hurry as they fired up 22 three point attempts. Behrend was too much as they won 91-81.

Todd Sturgin led a balanced scoring attack as he hit for 25 points on 9 of 14 shooting. He also collected 12 rebounds and two blocked shots.

Byron Thorne played a great overall game as he added 21 points with six assists and three steals. Rob Hunt contributed 17 points and a team leading 16 rebounds.

"You're only good as your last performance," said Coach Chris Gilmartin of the Lions' performance on Sunday.

He added, "It was a very good win for us. We lost to them in the beginning of the season. Our inside game of Hunt and Sturgin really played well."

On Saturday, the Lions played the 16-2 Presidents of Washington and Jefferson. The Lions hung with the Prexies early by only being down by five at the half, 35-30. W&J added to their lead in the second half as they won 81-65.

On February 9, the Lions travelled to Daemen to take on the Warriors. The game was tight as the Warriors had a 36-35 lead.


The Warriors were on the warpath as they increased their lead and won 79-68. Behrend was outrebounded 47-31 with the big advantage on the defensive glass, 40-26. Thorne had the big game for Behrend as he had 29 points and ten rebounds.

Thorne continues to lead the Lions in scoring as he has 533 points on the season for 23.2 ppg. He is also contributing 4.2 assists and 6.2 rebounds per game. He's shooting .56% from the field on the season.

Hunt is the team's leading rebounder as he is averaging eight

"Unfortunately their will be no postseason for this team, but you won't find a team in the East wanting to come in here and play us," said Gilmartin.

The Lions next play on Saturday at Hilbert, who they lost to earlier in the season.
