disciplines, will team-teach the course and all three will be present during each class session, Rossi explained.

Rossi said that "using people from different disciplines" will give the course "diversity" and an "other cultures' component."

The professors who will be team-teaching INTST 100 in the spring of 1995 are Rossi, who will provide the historical perspective; Dr. Gayle Morris, lecturer in economics; and Dr. Zachary Irwin, associate professor of political science.

INTST 400, "Seminar in International Studies," will be a lecture and discussion course in which students complete a research project, according to the Nov. 12, 1993 Division of Humanities and Social Sciences proposal for the international studies minor.

Rossi said that students will "apply what (they've) learned in (their) major(s) and other courses" to the research project.

According to Rossi and Salper, it is not known whether INTST 400 will be offered in the fall of 1995 or the spring of 1996 because, as Rossi said, "the sequence (of classes) depends on how many students sign up for the minor."

Rossi said of the minor, "It's pretty exciting what we're doing; it's innovative at the university

Salper agreed with Rossi and said, "We're very excited." She added, "The Office of International Programs at University Park has been very generous in support."
