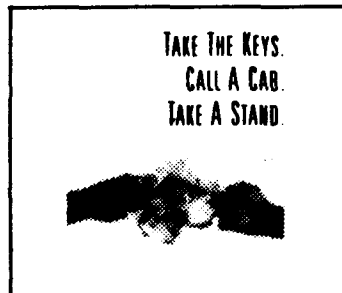
Aside from the new freshmen on campus, there are 20 new professors this semester at Behrend.
