The Behrend women's tennis team concluded its season on Saturday with the Cardinal Invite at Rochester.

In doubles Shelly Pearson and Rhonda Dennison lost in the semifinals to RIT. Steph Nelson and Chris Hughes fell to Allegheny in the second round. Behrend advanced Steph Nelson, Shanna Cotti, Rhonda Dennison, and Holly Olarzuk to the second round before being eliminated.

On Friday, Oct. 7, the team defeated St. John Fischer to put its final record at 9-5.

The women started off the season setting a Behrend record of six consecutive victories. This streak was broken by Frostburg State on Sept. 23.

Coach Chuck Keenan said, "They (Frostburg) were a solid team. They had a little more depth. They had a little more experience and that's where we ended up taking the fall."

The weekend was what Keenan considered the "biggest weekend of the season." It involved the

RC Chase Insurance Classic and a tri-match with Carnegie-Mellon and the University of Rochester. Behrend was defeated in the first round by John Carroll. However, in a consolation round Behrend defeated Carnegie-Mellon.

On Sunday, Sept. 25, Behrend lost to Carnegie-Mellon and the I Iniversity of its record at 7-4.

Behrend faced difficulties at Buffalo State on Sept. 29. The rainy weather forced an inside match which Keenan said, "was like playing in a bubble."

The courts were designed for a variety of other sports and had different lines on the floor for basketball, volleyball and tennis. Low-lighting did not help in Behrend's fifth loss of the season.

Despite the losses late in the season, Keenan feels that the season went extremely well.

"These ladies hate to lose and we definitely took our lumps...There were gutsy performances all the way down the line. Nobody ever gave up and I am extremely proud of these players," he said.
