October 23: A student was cited for driving over the grass median in "S" Lot.

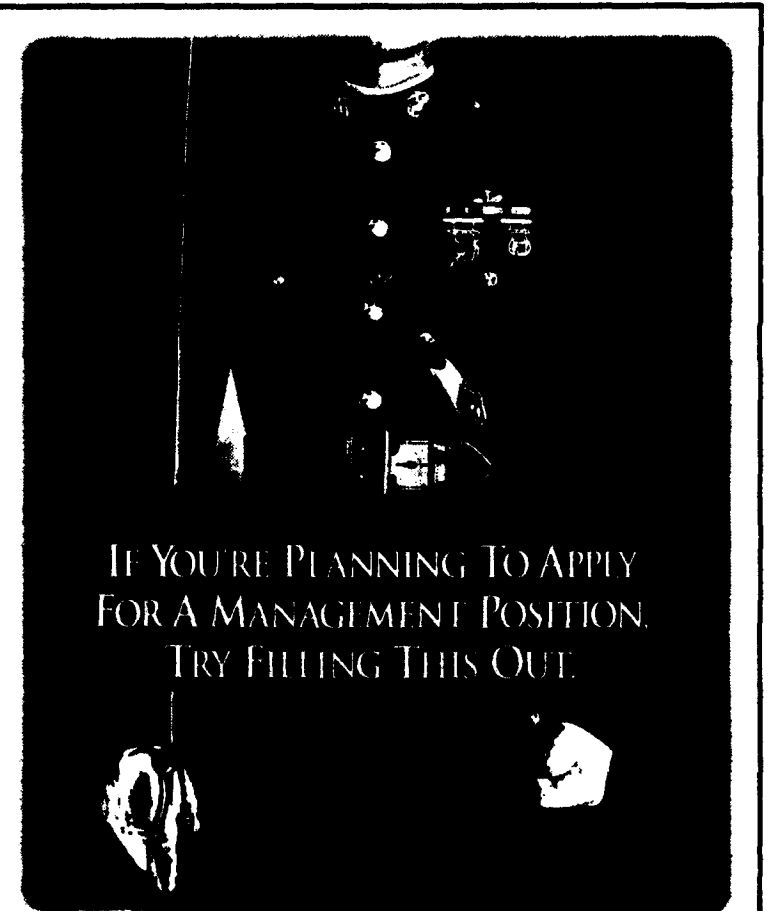
October 24: A student's vehicle was broken into and items were taken. The car was parked by Maintenance and Operations.
