Mallon defeats Mottillo in SGA election

Timothy Mallon replaces Mike Woycheck as SGA President

Timothy Mallon is SGA's new President. After lengthy debate and words from the candidates, SGA elected Mallon over Joe Motillo at last night's meeting.

Mallon's SGA vision includes, "...calling on the members of the Senate to fulfill the obligation they took when they decided to accept their respective positions."

Both candidates campaigned on a platform including parking, college drinking, campus activities, and the Student Activity fee.

"I'm not going to sit up here and say I know everything about SGA, because I don't think anybody does," Mallon said.

But Mallon does want to see more involvement from Senate members. He doesn't believe that the President should carry the burden of the entire organization

"We need to make SGA more open," Mallon said. "We need to bring SGA to the students, not the students to us.'

Motillo also championed increased openness of SGA, saying, "We need to put the student back in SGA."

On the topic of college drinking problems, Mallon agreed with Motillo that it was SGA's responsibility to take some sort of action.

What exactly that is, I'm not sure," he said. "I think we'd be kidding ourselves [in thinking

Dave Miller, SGA vicepresident, served as acting president during the interim last week, and will return to the vicepresident position.
