On Friday, November 3 at 8 pm, the Studio Theater will open it's fall season with the production of the Romulus Linney play, "Heathen Valley," directed by Tony Elliot.

The setting is a rural 19th century Appalachian mountain valley, full of simple people with simple and mysterious ways.

A bishop, an ex-convict janitor and a schoolboy venture into an obscure valley, each with his own agenda.

The story revolves around Deacon Starns (Mike Rush) and his attempt to convert the people of Heathen Valley. While there, he meets a host of characters, among them, Cora (Diane Hardiner) and Harlan (Robert Connick).

Other characters are portrayed by Bond Davis (Billy Cobb, the narrator), Mike Rush (Starns, the Deacon), Rebecca Wolford (Juba, the midwife), and Tracy D. Lee (the bishop).

character, "[Cora] should have been a man. She's fierce, practical...and not afraid."

Then there's Harlan, who Rob Connick describes as "messed up. He has a variety of psychological problems stemming from a troubled childhood and the death of his sister/wife."

The story itself is an

interesting one, told with humor and affection. "It's not religious, but it's about religion," says Elliot, who fell in love with the play while working for a theater in Washington, D.C.

Playwright Linney weaves a tale with humor and the realities of bare-boned existence in an often cruel and unforgiving world.
