HAMILTON, N.Y. (CPS)--Colgate University 1996 grads will get a crash course in living in the real world before they venture from campus.

While students learn a lot during college, even those graduating summa cum laude may not know how to finance a car, negotiate a lease, buy insurance or juggle bills, says Burgwell Howard, director of student activities at Colgate University. "These are all things they must learn in their transition from campus to the real world," says Howard.

1996 will immerse themselves in "Real World '96," a three-day event suggested by Colgate University President Neil Grabois. Before launching into their last semester, seniors will attend panels on auto purchasing, real estate, insurance and personal finance.

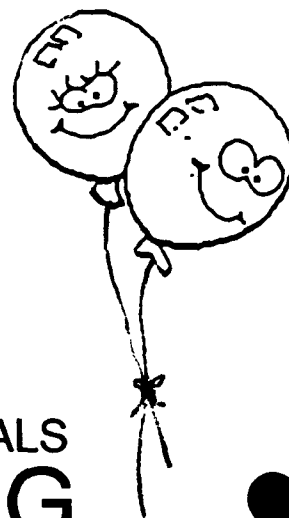

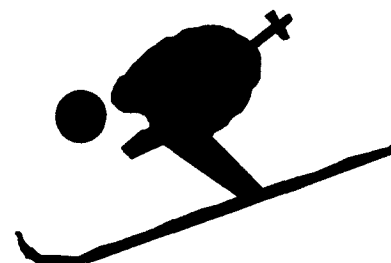
