### **Ebola threatens** 'monkey farm'

ALICE, Texas-The deadly Ebola virus has been reported in primates at a remote breeding center, called "the monkey farm" by

Most residents greeted the news nonchalantly, but it did pique some

interest in the film, Outbreak.

On Monday, public health officials confirmed that a strain of the virus was found in two monkeys imported from the Philippines to the privately owned Texas Primate Center.

No reports were made of bites or scratches to monkey handlers, but doctors are watching employees carefully as they attempt to contain the outbreak at the remote facility, miles from other houses amid

The property is filled with hundreds, if not thousands, of miniature huts. In several, monkeys could be seen drinking water and climbing the fenced walls.

Officials at the center on Monday refused to comment.

Ebola is one the world's deadliest diseases, causing 80 percent of its victims to bleed to death. It is spread through body fluids, usually through a break in the skin. There is no treatment or cure.

Federal experts diagnosed the Texas illnesses as a strain apparently less deadly to people than the strain that struck Zaire last year, killing

245 of 316 people infected with the virus.

The strain in Texas is similar--but not an exact match--to the Ebola strain that struck a Reston, Va. monkey facility in 1989. In Reston, four people were exposed to the Ebola virus but never got sick However, federal disease fighters protected by airtight suits had to kill every monkey and destroy the remains.

In Alice, doctors sought a Center for Disease Control diagnosis when one monkey died with bloody diarrhea. A second monkey with similar symptoms was killed and the CDC is examining the body.

#### Hair today, gone tomorrow

MORRISVILLE, PA-An impulsive haircutting will cost Richard "Lefty" Clunn at least \$300, up to \$21,000.

Clunn cut a two-foot ponytail off a waitress at Michael's Restaurant & Lounge on Dec 21, 1995. Michelle Rosati lost her 10year growth of hair when Clunn attempted to settle a debate with his brother. The question was: Are restaurant knives as sharp as the "Ginsu" knives advertised on television?

According to attorney Walter Campbell, Clunn was acting on impulse. He spotted Rosati's long hair, walked into the kitchen, grabbed a knife and did away with the 33-year old woman's pride and

Clunn, 51, was found guilty of harassment and given a fine Monday. He still faces Rosati's claims for \$21,000 in damages. Rosati wants Clunn to pay \$1,000 for every inch he chopped off.

#### Speed limits go up, deadly accidents increase

SACRAMENTO, Calif.-Deadly car crashes had been declining in California since 1987. During the first 11 weeks of higher speed limits, deadly car crashes have increased by more than 17 percent, an Associated Press review had.

Opponents of the speed increase initiated in December and January after the federal government dropped the 55 mph national speed limit, said they expected more highway deaths. Supports said they don't believe the increase in accidents has anything to do with the speed limit change.

According to highway patrol and state transportation officials it's too early to blame the accident increase on the rise in speed limits, aving a 12-month period would have to be studied before any reliable conclusions could be reached.

Crashes overall during the latest period with available statistics-Dec. 17, 1995 to Feb. 29, 1996--were up 8.6 percent compared to same period 12 months earlier, California Highway Patrol records show. Deadly accidents increased 17.2 percent, from 319 to 374.

#### Ford looks at fire potential

Ford Motor Co. says it is studying possible fire problems with ignition switches installed in some 23 million 1984-93 Ford ears and

However, the company maintains that a U.S. recall is unwarrented despite the recall of 248,000 cars and trucks with the switches in Canada. The U.S. government's auto safety agency is investigating whether an electrical short in the switches can cause steering column fires without warning.

Ford is advisining U.S. customers to replace the switch at their own expense if they are concerned.

Although there will not be any food items sold at the RUB desk, additional items will be sold in the Wintergreen Cafe.

The bookstore will still have its selections, and a mobile refreshment cart will be added.

The cart will supply such things as coffee, tea, soda, juice, Danishes and sandwiches.
