# Breaking the Surface

#### Public triumphs and private agonies of Olympic great

Greg Louganis will make a splash Monday, Scpt. 16, at Penn State-Behrend. His visit kicks off the 1996-97 Speaker Series.

Louganis' lecture "Breaking the Surface" will include both his public triumphs and his private agonies, domestic violence and living with AIDS. The lecture will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Reed Union Building Commons.

Louganis, the world's most decorated diver, tested positive for the HIV virus in March 1988, five months before the Olympics in Scoul and his near-disastrous head injury.

The results were not disclosed at that time and Louganis won two gold medals, in springboard and platform diving.

In June 1994, Louganis competed in the Gay Games in New York City, publicly acknowledging sexual his orientation.

Any further mystery surrounding Louganis' private life ended with the release of his autobiography, "Breaking the Surface," co-authored by Eric Marcus.

"For me, this book means no more secrets," Louganis writes in the introduction.

"I want people to know who I am and what I went through," he wrote. "Then if parents want their kids to grow up to be like me, I won't have to wonder, 'What if they really knew?'"

Louganis discusses how diving became a way to compensate for feelings of low self-esteem and worthlessness.

Following his injury in the preliminary event at Scoul, Louganis writes, "I sometimes can't believe what I had to go through to get to that point. And it wasn't just a bump on the head, not just the HIV diagnosis, but a lifetime of fear and pain and always feeling that the next dive would make it all right."

At the age of 16, Louganis won his first Olympic medal, a silver medal in platform diving at the 1976 Olympics in Montreal.

Louganis continued to compete in the Olympics winning four gold medals. He is the only male diver to win two

gold medals in consecutive Olympics.

Louganis also holds numerous national titles and has won the national championship diving title five times.

Upon retiring from diving, Louganis pursued an acting career in theater and television.

Louganis' lecture is part of the Speaker Series which continues throughout the school year.
