The pill, which triggers abortion during the early stages of pregnancy, has not yet received criticism from either side of the abortion debate. The final approval of RU-486 rests on resolving concerns about labeling and manufacturing.

Fire suspect set free after killing nine people

A judge ruled that Todd Hall will not be tried for setting a blaze that killed nine people. Hall's brain damage has left him mentally incompetent for trial purposes. Hurt in a skateboarding accident as a teen, Hall had a partial lobotomy in 1987. He allegedly set off firecrackers at a busy fireworks store on July 3 which sparked a blaze that killed four children and five adults. He was charged with involuntary manslaughter and aggravated arson.
