The largest crowd in Beaver Stadium history - 97,079 - witnessed the Nittany Lions, 63-14 victory over Ohio State on October 29, 1994. Penn State enters the 1996 season with a 169-38-0 record in Beaver Stadium, a winning percentage of 81.6.
