Dr. Botts receives Teaching Award

BEHREND - A lot of people don't think that science is relevant to their daily lives - but the 1996 winner of Penn State-Behrend's Council of Fellows Excellence in Teaching Award thinks different.


Assistant professor of biology, Dr. Pamela S. Botts will address the relevance of science to everyday life in her presentation "Convincing the Non-Scientist that Science is Relevant and Accessible, or You Don't Have to be a Rocket Scientist to Understand Science" that opens the Penn State-Behrend Provost's Speaker Series Wednesday, Nov. 20 at 12:00 p.m. in the Reed Commons.

Raised in a family of teachers, Botts said that she believes teaching is a social responsibility. According to her, she continues to search for the best ways to reach students and make what is taught personally applicable in their daily routine.

presentation demonstrate how science relates personally, professionally, and politically to each of our lives. I believe we must find a way to put science back into society and make it work for us. There isn't any part of our lives that isn't affected by science," said Botts.

In addition to classroom and laboratory teaching, Botts maintains a number of research interests including wetland plant ecology, distribution of organisms in streams and wetlands, and a recent collaborative interest, evolutionary ecology.
